The central theme of the Service is "Lay Witness," and it is hoped that four lay people, who took part in the Diocesan Mission last year, will speak briefly on what the Christian Faith means to them. They will be introduced by Capt. the Rev. L. W. Chidzey, of the Church Army, who will later sum up their message.

The Service will be preceded by Community Sing-

ing from 3.0 p.m. to 3.30 p.m.

There will be no Collection at the Service, but those who wish to contribute to the evangelistic work of the Diocese will have an opportunity to do so by means of Boxes at the door.
